CHARITABLE PURPOSES

- To create and maintain an accessible and inclusive play space in an existing urban pocket park.
- To facilitate and promote social interaction through play and recreation for all members of the community
- To ensure that Catherine Street Park is an all-ability play and recreation green space



DESIGN PRINCIPLES

- Not every element needs to be accessible to every child or young person
- But every child or young person should be able to access the social experience of play/choices
- Designed so features of the play area support a range of types of play, behaviours and activity

Challenges:

- Shared use by those of different age ranges
- Some issues of vandalism and anti-social behaviour (open 24/7)

This has been mitigated by:

- CCTV
- Good partnership arrangement with community police/schools
- Youth Engagement



BRIEF CHRONOLOGY

- 2016 working group formed led by parents of disabled children, local residents and partners (to campaign for inclusive and accessible play spaces)
- Feb 2017 D&G Council agreed to a £500k investment for 3 inclusive play parks in the region.
- Catherine Street Park was selected as the most appropriate site in Dumfries
- 2017-2018 neighbourhood, children and young people consultations
- Participatory appraisal approaches used design workshops for fencing, gates, equipment and play experiences.



CHRONOLOGY CONTINUED

- February 2018 Include Us established and registered as a SCIO
- April 2018 Asset Transfer from D&G Council to Include Us
- May 2018 Appointed Landscape architect after a tendering process



- Include Us & Catherine Street Park key case study in Play Scotland's new publication: Free to Play: A guide to creating accessible and inclusive public play spaces. (Launched at the Scottish Parliament 30th May 2018)
- June 2018 gained planning permission for changes to the existing park.



CHRONOLOGY CONTINUED


- July 2018 raised finances for purchase/installation of new play equipment/landscaping, office, outside storytelling area, gardening tools and staffing
- July 2019 appointed Development Manager.
- December 2019 appointed Community Gardener
- February 2020 The park formally opened.



- July 2020 finalists in the Landscape Institute Awards Excellence in Health and Wellbeing.
- 2023 UNICEF case study of inclusive spaces (publication pending)

DESIGN CONSIDERATIONS

- <u>Original site</u> small run down, local authority playpark, residential conservation area, Dumfries town centre
- <u>Aim</u> to make Catherine Street Play Park & Community Garden a welcoming, inclusive, accessible green space for all, in the heart of the town
- Opportunities for naturally playful recreation and education.
- Enhance play value & biodiversity by planting additional trees in addition to the existing 25 mature trees, site and to accommodate a range of informal play, leisure, cultural and educational activities.
- Accommodate a range of informal play, leisure, cultural and educational activities.




- Circular pathway, grass areas, flower beds, raised beds, accessible seating, water play feature, sand pit, play house, wheelchair swing, swings, a wheelchair roundabout and trampoline, slack line, climbing frame & sensory play equipment.
- Accessible and inclusive, a place to play, relax and spend enjoyable time together
- Gathering places as informal performance and educational space.





Seating and Benches

There are limited seating options in the park. PlayCan will have a couple of folding chairs available.

Things to be aware of

- This is a spacious, green park enclosed by walls and fences.
- There are four entrances into the park.
- When we visited the gates were all open. All are clearly visible from the area where we will be playing.
- The space is open to members of the public, who may have dogs with them.
- There is very little shelter in the park. Team PlayCan will bring a large tent and there is some shelter for playing under play equipment. We can also make dens and temporary shelters.
- There is a fairly 'typical' enclosed play area in the park with wood chip surfaces, including equipment for climbing, two nest swings, toddler swings.

PlayCan Resources

Team PlayCan will bring a range of resources including 'loose parts' play kit, percussion, pots & pans, large tent, shelter, tuff trays, chalk, parachute, sensory resources. There will be four staff from team PlayCan there to welcome you, and to support and facilitate play!

Toilets


There are no public toilets at the park. Public toilets available on Ayres Wynd, Prestonpans, EH32 9AB.

Wheelchair Access

The main surfaces are large grassy areas, with a couple of paths that take you across the park. The parks have bark on the ground, making access difficult for wheelchairs. Our activities will be located near the paths and on the flat tarmac sports area.


